#### **SUMMARY**

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Mr. Tom Acker announced his resignation from the Mercer Island City Council, Position No. 4, effective September 29, 2018 citing personal health concerns and family commitments. Pursuant to RCW 42.12.070, the Council shall appoint a qualified person to fill the vacant position within ninety (90) days. Though Washington State law does not provide for a specific procedure for selecting someone to fill the vacancy, Council followed the procedures in previous vacancies (1999, 2011, 2012, and 2015).

AMOUNT BUDGETED

APPROPRIATION REQUIRED

Position No. 4 will be up for election on the November 2019 ballot. This will mean there will be five seats up for election. Once appointed, the new councilmember will go through a comprehensive orientation and training.

Through the City's website, the MI Weekly, and the Mercer Island Reporter, residents were encouraged to apply for the vacancy by submitting a letter of interest, a resume and answers to supplemental questions. Twelve (12) applications were received by the deadline of November 21, 2018 at 5:00 pm. The candidates are (listed alphabetically): Lisa Anderl, Elizabeth Buckley, Heather Cartwright, Jonathan Conradt, Darren Gold, Traci Granbois, Thomas Hildebrandt, Leslie Meagley, Matt Murphy, Daniel Odievich, Craig Reynolds, and Kwan Wong. See Exhibit 1 for candidate applications.

#### **SPEECH QUESTIONS**

Each Candidate will have 3-5 minutes to speak to the Council. Answers to the following questions should be addressed in their speech:

- 1. Why do you want to serve on the City Council?
- 2. What experiences, talents or skills do you bring to the Council and community that you would like to highlight?
- 3. Are there any regional issues or forums in which you have a particular interest or expertise? (e.g. transportation, water supply, human services, water quality, fiscal management, solid waste, parks & open space, etc.)
- 4. Do you want to serve on the City Council because of a particular local issue on which you want to work or are your interests more broadly distributed?

The Council may ask additional questions of candidates during their speech.

At the December 11, 2018 Special Council Meeting, Council will nominate and vote from the candidate group for appointment to vacant Position No. 4. The nomination procedures will be outlined in the agenda bill.

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- 1. Why are you interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?
  - LA I am interested in participating in the community, and in serving the citizens of the island. I think I represent the views of many residents in terms of fiscal issues, development, and other areas of concern. My involvement with the City and the CAG over the past year makes it pretty clear to me that this service is a relatively thankless task, but I do think that people who care about the community need to get involved.
- 2. What strength would you bring to the Council?
  - LA I think my biggest strengths are the ability to absorb and analyze a lot of information relatively quickly, and my ability (which I hope you saw in the CAG) to have differences of opinions while remaining courteous to those with opposing views.
- 3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?
  - LA The highest priorities in my view are (1) balancing the budget; (2) maintaining desired levels of service; and (3) mobility and transportation issues for Island residents. I will need more information on what the current status is on all of these issues before I can formulate a detailed response, but I think we can attack the budget issues with targeted cuts or freezes to certain areas (if necessary), and possibly a reduction of the reserves. I will need to see where we are through total 2018 before we know what might be required. Service levels for police, fire, counselors, and seniors must be maintained. There are likely areas that can be looked at in terms of preserving those functions, while reducing other areas of spending. We should also work closely with the Foundation to see if they can increase their fundraising and their contribution to YFS. I think we need to prioritize parking for Island residents, and look forward to learning more about this issue to further develop my thoughts on how it can be accomplished.
- 4. Explain your current and past community involvement and/or service on city, nonprofit, or public boards, committees, task forces, or commissions and how this has contributed to the Mercer Island community. Address its relevance to the position of Mercer Island City Councilmember.
  - LA My previous involvement has been limited, due to the demands of my job. However, as you know, I recently dedicated a number of hours to the CAG and to the No on Prop 1 campaign. Through those efforts I have learned a lot about city operations, finance, and priorities, and have had extensive communication with friends and neighbors on the Island, hearing about their concerns. I think this recent experience positions me well to step into the open position.
- 5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?
  - LA I would like to lead an effort to gain back the trust of the majority of the citizens/voters. I think the outcome on Prop 1 says that the residents of the Island either don't believe that the City needs more money, or don't trust the City to use it properly. I think communication with the residents needs to be improved, and the Council needs to demonstrate that it is hearing and acting on the priorities of the majority of the residents.
- 6. What is your vision for our City and community?
  - LA My vision is to keep Mercer Island a safe, green, and friendly place. I have always felt it to be a safe haven from the big cities on both sides, and I would like to see the Island retain a degree of small-town feel, recognizing that growth, and ST, will make that somewhat of a challenge. I would like to see the city consider how to balance those forces and find the best balance for our citizens, not necessarily accommodate the needs of other cities before our own.
- 7. Is there anything else that you may wish to add that would help us get to know you a better?
  - LA My husband Matt and I have lived on the Island since 1999. We have friends who have been on the Island since the 1964 earthquake. We love the parks and trails where we walk Rufus our chocolate lab, the easy access to the cities, and the friendly people who live here. I drive the speed limit, and clean up after my dog. I like to golf, but am not looking to put a course on the Island. We love it here. We want to keep it good and make it better.

#### 1. Why are you interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

I am interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember as I enjoy working on demanding and challenging issues and projects. Mercer Island must now work with budget constraints while the island continues to advocate for access to I-90 and commuter parking. Most importantly, we need to replace aging water and sewer lines for the entire island. I am dedicated to working on these issues along with downtown development, protection of our parks, and protection of funding for our police, fire, parks and schools.

#### 2. What strength would you bring to the Council?

My strength is taking complex and challenging projects on headfirst, and seeing them to a successful completion. I've worked for two organizations facing significant budget crises and have witnessed lean management and budget cuts applied to a failing hospital with significant success. I've also worked with boards, volunteers, donors, and the public throughout my life with various roles in NPO's and in my professional music career. I greatly enjoy inspiring people through mission and service to a cause and working on large, complex projects and issues with groups. In this case, I have a deep and profound love for Mercer Island and its people and I will work to be a steward of this community and an advocate for the people who live here.

# 3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?

- 1. Budget constraints Assist City staff to identify meaningful cuts to their budgets. Prioritize the needs of the community moving forward. Identify grants and funding sources that are not currently being utilized. Reallocate funds and look for efficiencies in individual departments and across departments. Work with City Manager to institute performance metrics for staff and chart workflow output of city departments and staff.
- 2. Access and parking Continue to assess and work on mobility and transportation issues on the island in conjunction with our access to I-90 as East Link is constructed. Work on commuter parking in conjunction with light rail and work to advocate for Mercer Island in the region and the state level as East Link proceeds mindful of the impacts of additional buses and traffic downtown.
- 3. Water and sewer lines Work to understand the budget and timeline for complete replacement with fellow City Councilmembers, staff, and industry experts. Analyze funding sources, and work to educate the public on expenditures and timeline along with a proposal for the community.

4. Explain your current and past community involvement and/or service on city, nonprofit, or public boards, committees, task forces, or commissions and how this has contributed to the Mercer Island community. Address its relevance to the position of Mercer Island City Councilmember.

I served on the Sound Transit Citizen's Advisory Group, and advocated for Mercer Island with numerous appearances at Sound Transit, City Council meetings and wrote editorials which were published in the Seattle Times and Mercer Island Reporter, and met with area and regional leaders. I established and formed an advocacy group, Save I-90, and worked with area leaders to advocate for our access to I-90 at the state level. I co-authored a paper that was presented in Olympia on the challenges facing Mercer Island with the loss of our center lanes and HOV access. Our pressure along with that exerted by others and traffic engineers alerted Sound Transit that there were indeed issues and negative impacts with their Eastlink plan and Mercer Island's access to I-90. I also have chaired auctions and dinners and volunteered for many agencies in the area. I raised \$122,000 for Island Park's Hand and Hand Auction and have been an advocate for our schools, teachers and staff. In addition, I have met with MICA leadership and performed advocacy via a FB interview outlining my experiences in the performing arts and the importance of supporting YTN and young students in their training and pursuit of the fine and applied arts.

# 5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

I want to work with City Councilmembers and our City Manager to assist staff to identify meaningful cuts to their budgets, and identify grants and funding sources that are not currently being utilized. I will continue to assess and work on mobility and transportation issues on the island in conjunction with our access to I-90 as East Link is constructed. I will work to understand the budget and timeline for complete replacement of our water and sewer lines with fellow City Councilmembers, staff, and industry experts. I will also analyze funding sources, and work to educate the public on expenditures and timeline along with a proposal for the community for the complete replacement of our water and sewer lines.

In addition to the first three priorities I outlined, I would like to work on the protection of parkland and green spaces on Mercer Island. I would like to lead and explore the process of placing our parks into a trust and forming a foundation that can fundraise for ongoing projects the community would like to see beyond budgeted upgrades and maintenance. I will meet with the Superintendent and continue discussion on proper funding and granting sources for our school counselors. In addition, I will work with MIYFS to outline a plan for the community where counselors are annually funded via an agreement with the MISD, and explore fundraising options if necessary and assist with identifying grants. This is a priority in this community and needs fully addressed. I also will work on future parks and school funding initiatives, and work with City councilmembers, staff, and our City Manager to assess future funding needs for our parks and schools in conjunction with expiring levies, and the need to propose new levies to keep funding levels current.

#### 6. What is your vision for our City and community?

My vision for Mercer Island includes more input from the citizens and more transparency and accountability from our city's leadership. I would like to properly utilize our citizen advisory groups' advice and build a bridge of trust back to the public showing them that they are valued for their time and service. I also envision a community that is united on funding for its schools, counselors, fire and police, and leadership who doesn't threaten our basics while unnecessary expenditures are approved. I am inspired by big and bold projects and I like challenges.   - 1) **Collaboration.** Island politics have been divisive in the last several years and shouldn't be. There is universal commitment to the success of our community, and lots of ways to be successful, but we shouldn't be labelling or negating each other's ideas. I'm concerned about the culture developing of 'yes' or 'no', right and left, and closed-door conversations. Transparency, diversity of ideas, and establishing a positive forum for dialogue are key components of my communication and essential if we want to identify the best solutions. If part of the future council, collaboration and consensus will be a founding pillar of my participation. I want to bring both sides together and find solutions.
  - 2) Data driven decisions. In my experience with the CAG, there was a disconnect in the way the city is currently collecting and applying data as we make decisions. I learned from the CAG process that we have an incredible leadership staff in our city with in-depth knowledge of how our city runs and a deep passion for the island. Yet I believe our staff could be more powerful, and their work commitment could be showcased more clearly if we could document their efforts through metrics and better data measurements. In many of the analytics I saw, our city spent a large amount of time comparing ourselves to other communities for justification on how we should operate in government, instead of looking at what others do as input, and leveraging our own community values and actual operations a guide.

I want to help Mercer Island continue as a leading community. I hope to bring more community members engaged in the governing process, not feel like they must confront it. We have an amazingly educated population, and benefit from citizens who are passionate about issues and benefit community discussion because they often bring both expertise and a perspective that respects our community values. There are opportunities to improve how we use data inputs, leverage our citizen contributions, and to improve data sharing amongst our community that can generate and pride across the community in how we lead our government. I hope to instill some of this viewpoint and leadership through my contributions on the council.

Jonathan Conradt Interview Questions

1. Why do you want to serve on the City Council?

The City Council faces two significant problems. The first is the structural imbalance in the budget which will require deeper cuts in 2021 and 2022. The second was demonstrated by the failure of Prop 1. The residents of Mercer Island don't trust what the city staff or city council said would happen if Prop 1 failed.

In my professional career, I have frequently been asked to resolve distrust between teams, organizations, and even companies. I think that I can help build some trust between residents and their city government. For me, this is the most pressing issue faced by the city.

2. What experiences, talents or skills do you bring to the Council and community that you would like to highlight?

I have led large and small technology teams. I have started and run my own business, with all the budgeting and creativity that requires. I have volunteered with small and national organizations. These experiences have taught me to listen first, and follow the data even when it disagrees with my biases.

Serving as a member of the Mercer Island Youth and Family Services Foundation Board, and as a member of the Community Advisory Group has taught me that public organizations face different legal, structural, and contractual problems than for-profit companies.

I also expect that there will be opportunities for the city to embrace cloud based service delivery which could save the city time and money while improving service levels. My background would be useful to the council as we evaluate our options.

3. Are there any regional issues or forums in which you have a particular interest or expertise? (e.g., transportation, utilities, human services, fiscal management, solid waste, parks and open space, etc.)

As a member of the Mercer Island Radio Operators, and a Disaster Services Technology volunteer with the American Red Cross, I am interested in public safety and how the region is preparing for local disasters like earthquakes.

As a volunteer and Vice President of the Mercer Island Youth and Family Services Foundation, I am interested in the services and support the region can provide our senior population so they can age in their homes. I am also interested in how the region supports our youth and families, especially those who need the professional expertise of mental health counselors.

4. Do you want to serve on the City Council because of a particular local issue on which you want to work or are your interests more broadly distributed?

I would be happy to serve in any capacity and work across the breadth of city departments and services.

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Serving as a member of the Mercer Island Youth and Family Services Foundation Board, and as a member of the Community Advisory Group has taught me that public organizations face different legal, structural, and contractual problems than for-profit companies.

I also expect that there will be opportunities for the city to embrace cloud based service delivery which could save the city time and money while improving service levels. My background would be useful to the council as we evaluate our options.

3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?

The first is the structural imbalance in the city budget, which may be exacerbated by the recent decline in stock and home values. The Prop 1 vote showed that residents overwhelmingly prefer service cuts to property tax increases. While I would join too late to vote on the 2019-2020 budget, I expect that much of the next two years will be overshadowed by the need to reduce services in preparation for the next biannual budget. The city must provide fire, police, clean water, and other mandated services, which will require cuts in many other areas and tough decisions.

The second is the expressed and persistent lack of trust in the city council and city staff, as demonstrated by the 57% of residents who rejected the endorsement of current and former mayors and council members, as well as disbelief in the proposed budget offered by the city staff. This lack of trust makes even small city council decisions, or city staff personnel changes controversial.

In my experience, trust is built slowly through consistent behavior. As a city council member I would seek to be open and transparent with the data being used to make my decisions. I would establish "office hours" where I would be available at the Mercer Island Community Event Center lobby for anyone who wants to sit and talk through their issues. We may disagree, but when we do it will be because we looked at the same data and came to an honest conclusion.

The third is the perpetual question of dynamic cities. What do we want to be in ten years? As Light Rail potentially brings new employers to our island, new customers to our stores and restaurants, and easier access for non-residents the north end of the island will face new pressure to change. Those changes can be positive or negative. They can reinforce the advantages of our island, or they can undermine them. I don't profess to have an answer or a strong bias for what we should be in ten years, but I know that progress rarely comes accidentally or despite the decisions of a community. The controversy over MICA demonstrates that Mercer Island is not aligned on this important question.

I began working in South Lake Union as Amazon and others began to transform the area. Six years later there is less crime, but more traffic. There is more retail and restaurant options, but there are more cold glass skyscrapers. There is a trolley, and there are fewer places for middle income families to live. Mercer Island is not facing the same scale of change, but it will face ever increasing pressure to change. While some of us will choose to mimic the national motto of Luxembourg, "We want to be who we are", others will want to encourage growth to move the city from a reliance on property taxes to B&O and sales taxes. The city council is at the heart of defining the future of the city, and to succeed that decision must be trusted, financially responsible, and aligned with the vision of the residents.

Until recently the majority of my community service has been through my church. I have served in lay clergy positions for most of the last twenty years. For nine years this service in San Jose, California frequently required me to interact with poverty, drug addiction, sorrow, and fraudulent requests for help. For two years in my youth I served in Sweden and Finland, learning Swedish, and worked closely with hundreds of families and individuals. Many of them were immigrants struggling to overcome the tragedies and challenges from their previous country while learning a new language and attempting to adopt a new culture. My experience as a member of the lay clergy of my church has shown me the real needs of communities, and the impact an efficient communal effort can have.

Since moving to Mercer Island I have been active with the Mercer Island Radio Operators (MIRO), and founded the MIRO Foundation to support emergency communications infrastructure and training on the island. It's a small non-profit today, but it is growing. As a MIRO member I have trained with emergency

responders on the island. I have completed DHS training. I have toured regional 911 centers. These experiences have taught me how fragile our Mercer Island infrastructure is and the benefits of having a city that is preparing for the eventual earthquake.

Through my involvement with MIRO, I decided to take the training to be a volunteer in Disaster Services Technology for the American Red Cross. This last October I deployed for the first time during the hurricane relief operation in North Carolina. This gave me an ringside seat to the interactions between public, private, and non-profit organizations working together to serve the community. These interactions were not always smooth, efficient, or coordinated but at the end of the day the citizens of North Carolina received help. This experience taught me that good people can disagree while still serving the same goals. It also taught me that coordination between agencies, jurisdictions, and organizations is complex, time consuming, and sometimes inefficient.

Since July I have served on the Mercer Island Youth and Family Services Foundation board as its Vice President. As a volunteer and board member for the last two and a half years I have worked closely with other volunteers to raise money to support the services offered by the city. I have learned that MIYFS serves our seniors, families, and youth beyond the very visible school mental-health counselor positions. The Foundation board is independent from the city department and not a governance board. The Foundation exists to support and maintain the services many of our residents receive. As a board member I have frequently disagreed with my fellow board members, and advocated positions that were rejected. However, the board has benefitted from these differences in perspective, and we have been able to move forward without animosity. Indeed, our trust and esprit de corps has only increased through these discussions. This experience, I believe, will serve me well on the city council.

5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

The appointment term is short. This is a unique benefit for whomever is appointed because in about eleven months after their appointment they will face a reckoning with the residents of the island. Has the new council member demonstrated they are trustworthy? Is the city moving in the right direction?

Between now and November 2019, my greatest accomplishment would be to convince the majority of residents that the sum of my actions, words, and council votes are worthy of their trust and vote.

6. What is your vision for our City and community?

I want people to strive to move to Mercer Island not because the commute is short but because the community is tight, not because the view is beautiful but because the vision is shared, not because the trees provide solitude but because the neighborhoods are warm and welcoming.

7. Is there anything else that you may wish to add that would help us get to know you a better?

I grew up in Nebraska. My family was middle class, but if you wanted money to spend you had to earn it. I would get up every morning at 6 AM and deliver papers. Some mornings I would inevitably wake up to a blizzard. These were my favorite mornings. It was me against the wind. I would use a sled to carry the papers. The route would take me a long time. My parents never offered to help.

It took me almost six months to save up the money I needed to buy my Commodore Vic-20, and then six more months to buy the Commodore 64. As a fourteen year old I sold my first piece of software. Eventually I was able to graduate from college without debt thanks in part to the money I made as an independent consultant for Apple.

These early experiences taught me to be frugal, to work hard for long-term goals, and the value of finding creative solutions to hard problems. I think Mercer Island needs all of these things.

It is also said that confirmation bias leads to less than ideal results. Having a sitting city councilmember with alternate viewpoints will help to alleviate any confirmation bias issues of the MICC. It is often said that having to discuss ones views when challenged will lead to better results. I am aware that I am likely to be on the losing side of votes much more often than not, but being able to challenge views and biases to help the MICC move towards better policy for Mercer Island will be a reward in itself. We all want Mercer Island to be the best place to raise children anywhere.

Below are three examples of where I diverge from the MICC and the dominant view of its members.

- 1) The Settlement with Sound Transit: I would have voted no on the settlement with Sound Transit. In addition, if I would have voted yes to an agreement with Sound Transit, the first payment would be to those funding the litigation, the taxpayers of Mercer Island. It was, and still is, the first duty of the MICC to end the utility tax that funded the lawsuit. Once the funders of the lawsuit were paid, then other benefits to Mercer Island could be funded. That is the right thing to do.
- 2) Proposition 1: I would have voted No on the tax that the MICC put to the people of Mercer Island as Proposition 1. Further, I would have proposed moving the proposition put to the voters of Mercer Island to be more in line with the minority report of the CAG.

I will be living on Mercer Island for the foreseeable future, and desire to preserve the quality of life that my family and I have enjoyed here. We live in a community where the relationship between outlay (in the form of taxes) and value received is perhaps more highly valued. I think I can help in maximizing the value that the City provides.

2. What strengh would you bring to the council?

I have four main strengths that would be most useful to me as a council member: I have experience working on committees, building consensus and moving toward a common goal; I have an intuitive sense of the interrelationships of large and complex entities; I can read and understand lengthy legal documents, helping to interpret Mercer Island's position in current and future arrangements; and I am inherently patient, allowing me to work well with people of varying backgrounds and degrees of experience.

- 3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?
- 1) Maintaining the general quality of life and quiet enjoyment is very important to Mercer Island citizens. This is a broad issue with many impacts, among which are the preservation of parks and open spaces, limiting the impacts of construction projects, and controlling daily noise levels. These issues can largely be addressed through sensible regulation and enforcement.
- 2) The City of Mercer Island must continue to support its school system. A community's valuation of education is correlated with a low crime rate and the absence of a host of other problems. I think the City can continue to support the School District at historical levels, provided that funds are allocated effectively.
- 3) The lack of availability of commuter parking at the North End is an ongoing issue. The City cannot effectively address this problem by itself, so we must appeal to larger entities (King County Metro, Sound Transit and WSDOT) for funds to build adequate parking.
- 4. Explain your current and past community involvement and/or service on city, nonprofit, or public boards, committees, task forces, or commissions and how this has contributed to the Mercer Island community. Address its relevance to the position of Mercer Island City Councilmember.

I was a member of the Mercer Island Aircraft Noise Abatement Committee in 1998 and 1999. For our work, the committee was collectively awarded Mercer Island's Citizen of the Year Award in 2000. As a result of our efforts, strong lobbying by a neighboring community to institute flight scattering was voted down by the Port Commission.

My special contributions to the committee were in analyzing past data and demonstrating that the FAA's proposed flight scattering would actually worsen the effects of noise associated with SeaTac Airport. I also worked behind the scenes to maintain cohesion within the committee, so we could present a united front at the Port's hearings.

Presently, I am serving as a Trustee on Mercer Island's Open Space Conservancy Trust Board. In this position, we are responsible for preserving the natural state of Mercer Island's single most valuable asset (Pioneer Park). My experience on the OSCT Board reinforces for me the value of consensus while moving toward a common goal. Even so, I am prepared to take a stand on issues of importance, and have done so.

As a City Councilmember, my responsibilities would increase, but the core values of consensus and compromise would remain.

5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

The central issue facing the council is how to plan its future finances. There is no question that the City will need voters to approve a levy lid lift, to continue to provide services at acceptable levels. Therefore we need to study the causes of the recent election outcome, and present voters with an updated proposal. If I can contribute to a desirable resolution of that issue, my time would be well spent.

6. What is your vision for our City and community?

Mercer Island is a jewel in the middle of Lake Washington – an urban oasis convenient to centers of commerce on either side. Within the constraints of the Growth Management Act, I would like to preserve as much as possible the rural sense of Mercer Island. The opening of EastLink across the Island will bring its own problems, which are best addressed proactively.

On top of that, we must strive to maintain the facilities and programs that make the Island an attractive place to settle, raise a family and retire.

7. Is there anything else that you may wish to add that would help us get to know you a [sic] better?

I like to cook, and enjoy outdoor activities.

#### 1. Why are you interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

In the coming years, the City will be challenged to maintain the best of this community in light of the need to address our financial structural imbalance and the pressures of the growing Puget Sound population.

The significant budget cuts agreed to by the Council this week put the City on the path of downsizing to align services with the dollars to provide them. How we implement these changes will have long term ramifications to the Island's quality of life. The Council, City staff and the community now must begin the conversations and hard work to prioritize and find new and creative ways to deliver and fund the services Islanders most care about. All ideas need to be on the table, including revisiting existing partnerships, creating new relationships with private and non-profit entities, engaging new funding sources, exploring new delivery models, and finding new technologies to enhance efficiencies, to name a few.

At the same time, Mercer Island is blessed with real opportunities. The coming Link Light Rail station will increase access for our residents to travel throughout the region and bring new people who can enliven our downtown. The envisioned mix use project that includes a regional arts center can be a gathering center for Island creativity. Responsibility for making the most of these and other opportunities will fall to the Council and City leadership to engage our community and find workable solutions.

I am submitting this application because I want to be actively involved in finding the sustainable solutions that will keep Mercer Island the desirable place it is for people of all ages within this new environment.

# 2. What strengths would you bring to the Council?

City leadership must be thoughtful, pragmatic, transparent and apolitical. I bring the commitment and ability to listen and learn from all of our citizens, actively engage with organized groups, work hard to understand and push for solutions that go beyond the ways we've traditionally approached problems, stay focused on our priorities and find compromises and solutions that work for the long

I've been active in Mercer Island organizations for many years – from serving on the MI Reporter Editorial Board in the early 2000s to the Citizens Advisory Group in 2018. In each of those environments I worked to build consensus among divergent perspectives.

My work experience leading and inspiring teams, analyzing problems, constructing and being accountable to budgets, developing creative solutions and building consensus around their implementation extends beyond the work place to civic volunteering.

Serving on the CAG and working on the Prop 1 campaign committee gave me a deep understanding of the City's financial challenges and the concerns that the voters and community have about the City. I am in a position to hit the pavement running on these issues.

Additionally, I have successfully managed high profile projects such as the search for Seattle's Leadership Tomorrow ED, which was closely watched and praised by groups throughout Seattle.

# 3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?

### A. Addressing the Structural Imbalance in the City's Budget

By the time this position is filled, the Council will have determined how to address the structural imbalance in the immediate biennium, but the structural imbalance is a long term issue. The Council must continue to provide clear direction to the City Manager throughout this process, setting service priorities and targets for financial savings so that she and her team can successfully implement these changes. The City Manager's fiscal sustainability plan will be a key issue for Council consideration, plus there will be a real need to reach into the community and work together to find creative solutions such as new partners, sources of support and alternative ways to deliver services.

The structural imbalance creates even deeper financial challenges for the City in the next two bienniums. The Council needs to keep that reality in mind in all immediate decisions. Of deep personal concern is the need to maintain (at minimum) and rebuild (ideally) an adequate contingency fund so that a major event doesn't throw the City into a true crisis. Before tapping our reserves, City staff and the Council must look for significant savings through service reductions and other means.

## B. Successfully developing the Tully's site

The Tully's site development presents an exciting opportunity for the Island. In the best of all worlds, it can solve our commuter parking shortage, integrate one of the two access points to Light Rail station into our town center and provide a home to an exciting arts center that can become a major asset for the Island. Three-way development partnerships involving private, public and non-profit entities are unusual and complicated. It will be very important to engage neighbors through structured and unstructured meetings to understand and address their concerns. Getting this project from concept to reality will take significant staff and council time and attention.

# C. Turning access to Light Rail into a Community Asset

With the opening of the Light Rail station scheduled for 2023, Mercer Island will be tackling how best to integrate the station with our Town Center. Improved access to the greater Puget Sound community has the potential to bring new vibrancy to our businesses and community institutions and activities, but the Council will need to work closely with the community, Sound Transit and other public entities to ensure we anticipate and address traffic management, integration with our Park&Ride, bus transfers, public safety, pedestrian access, and other issues.

# 1. Why are you interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

I love living on the Mercer Island. It is a nice and quiet place right in the middle of very exciting region. I really appreciate that it can not physically expand and must play nice within the physical constraints that come from it being an island, while also integrating nicely with Seattle and Bellevue, both of which are growing at incredible pace.

I've been looking at many decisions the council made since we've moved here in 2009, from the recommendation for sizing and planning of the Town Center, to the recommendations for residential development (of which we have so much now), to the integration with the rest of the region (Sound Transit, highways, sewer grid updates). To me, the activities of the council seemed interesting because of the number of complex variables that must be judged and appreciated against competing interests, and challenges in achieving consensus.

I have not considered running for the Council seat before, but I have always wondered what it would be to participate in government beyond just voting. This opportunity to try my hand at helping make critical city decisions appeals to me because I can see if it is something that I can do, like or be good at without having to commit to campaigning upfront.

# 2. What strength would you bring to the Council?

I am an experienced professional in the enterprise software field, where I evaluate and juggle many complex variables daily, making recommendations to my clients on major capital expenditures. I also participate and sometimes direct execution of complex projects with sizeable teams involved between my company and customer. In those situations, managing complexity, achieving consensus and directing execution are the core skills that I have developed and use every week.

I am also an immigrant to this country, having come here in mid-90ies as a young adult as refugee from Russia with nothing but my ambitions. I have successfully integrated into the country and the region. I found a job working in a machine shop, running drill presses and lathes and smelting lead for company making nuclear waste disposal protection blankets at Hanford. Very quickly, though, through the passion for computers that I had since very young age I found a job in software field and have been working in this field ever since. While I make enough money to live comfortably on the island, I do not forget the realities of my family's humble start living on food stamps and how to budget according to the income.

When I care about something, I am very enthusiastic and productive in getting things done.

# 3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?

First, I am concerned about maintaining level of services that the city provides. The messaging put out by the city convinced me of the importance of finding additional sources of revenue to counteract inflation and pay increases. Should the levy lid pass, I would work hard to make sure that the money is properly spent. Should it not, I would like to help figure out how to create another proposal that will, while simultaneously seeing how best to cut budgets without upsetting too many things.

Second, I believe that the town center is in major need of serious development, including more high-storied buildings for professionals who want to work in Seattle but live somewhere quieter, perhaps while they are having their first child.

I have heard arguments about importance of keeping the small town feel of the town center, and for limiting the height, and remain thoroughly unconvinced by both. We have no small-town feel right now – we have strip malls with nothing to do, and no attractions for off-island people to visit. I am a big fan of higher, more dense buildings, to counteract the single-family sprawl throughout the rest of the island and the entire region.

Instead, I believe that with the light rail coming, Mercer Island town center should seize the opportunity and encourage development of dense condos and apartments to serve to cater for the people working in SLU as well as in Redmond (at the major centers of software development).

Third, (and directly following the second point above), I believe that the integration with the rest of the region (light rail, buses, any other kinds of transportation) has to continue to be managed and be better explained to the citizens of the island. There are constant calls for additional parking to accommodate local Park&Ride space shortage, and various musings about autonomous electric buses moving islanders around from place to play. There is never enough parking and there are no autonomous buses in the world that work, and none on the horizon. I would like to see how the P&R can be expanded (maybe by building another floor on top?) or maybe it can be somehow partially reserved just for islanders a-la Zone sticker like in some neighborhoods in Seattle.

4. Explain your current and past community involvement and/or service on city, nonprofit, or public boards, committees, task forces, or commissions and how this has contributed to the Mercer Island community. Address its relevance to the position of Mercer Island City Councilmember.

I have not been involved in any city, non-profit, committees or commissions yet.

My community contributions are so far all in the volunteering at West Mercer Elementary, where for the last 6 years of my children being there, I taught reading to bunch of kindergarteners, helped with art and chaperoned various school trips.

I also helped clean Mercerdale park hill behind my house from blackberries when the call for volunteers goes out for the Sound trail management partnership.

# 5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

I would like to help with the current funding increase dilemma, however it shakes out during the November election.

For my own personal goal, if accepted, I also would like to see if I like being part of government. The speed of decision making may not be for me, but I won't know until I try.

# 6. What is your vision for our City and community?

I don't imagine that the allure of our quiet island is likely to diminish any time soon. I believe that very rich people will continue to be attracted to the expensive view houses lining the coasts, with merely well-to-do people living in places in the middle of the island (kind of like where I am in Mercerdale).

I would like to see many more condos and apartments in the town-center with young(er) professionals from Microsoft/Amazon/Google, perhaps starting families with children that go to public schools, commuting to work via rail/bus.

I would like to see more restaurants near where the commuters disembark and pass through the town-center, and more retail supporting them and commuters through the island who may want to stop by for a drink/meal.

I see continuing support for steady rebuilding of island single-family home with developers like JayMarc. Although I am not the biggest fan of enlarging the old homes by 2x or more as it appears to be done, but do I realize that's both what the market wants and what makes money for developers, and it does (I think) bring revenue to the city and new citizens to the island.

I would like to continue to support art enrichment programs from Art Council.

I would really like to see the city find the place and support the MICA, even though it appears to be a divisive issue and the space on the island is quite short.

# 7. Is there anything else that you may wish to add that would help us get to know you a better?

I have a well-rounded set of interests spanning computers, aerospace, astronomy, economics and history.

My background as a refugee from USSR, starting here in USA from absolute bottom gives me both humility and deep sense of appreciation of what our society brings, starting in the local space.

I am extremely glad my wife forced us to look on the island even though it was a financial stretch. I like the people surrounding me and I feel just as integrated into the town fabric as anyone else.

My pragmatic and budget-conscious nature serves our family well while managing our household plans and finances and should be useful in helping direct city's development.

# 1. Why are you interested in serving as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

Mercer Island is a special community. We have 475 acres of parkland, incredible natural beauty in a near-perfect location next to a major city, a full-service community and events center, an amazing school system, easy car and mass transit access to Seattle and eastside suburbs, police officers and fire fighters to keep us safe, and a publicly funded youth and family services program to provide a social safety net with help for those who need it. More importantly, we have an educated, passionate, and caring population with an active commitment to volunteerism and community service. I have lived in many cities around the country, and none of the others provide the quality of life that Mercer Island provides.

I want to live the rest of my life here, and I want to do my part to make sure that the city can continue to provide the quality of life to which I and my family have grown accustomed. I know the city faces financial stresses that will make delivering a broad suite of quality city services difficult, but I believe my financial background makes me well-qualified to find the best solutions for maintaining city services and infrastructure that residents demand.

# 2. What strength would you bring to the Council?

I have had a 30+ year career as an actuary focusing on understanding, forecasting, quantifying, and mitigating future financial risks—skills that the city desperately needs. Financially, the city faces two very serious problems. First, with the failure of Proposition One, there is an operating budget hole that will be difficult to fill. Second, the city has a variety of capital projects on the wish list, including potentially expensive upgrades to water and sewer systems. I believe my experience helping insurers to manage their financial affairs to ensure that they can meet their long-term promises to policyholders will allow me to contribute meaningfully to the search for long-term solutions that will allow the city to meet its commitments to its residents. These solutions will require creativity, an open mind, a sharp pencil, and dogged determination—all of which I will bring to the table.

I recognize that the Council is a collaborative body. No councilmember can accomplish anything alone. I am a dedicated coalition builder and can work to create consensus on appropriate Council goals and strategies. I am a clear communicator, both orally and in writing. I will keep an open mind to any and all solutions in order to maximize value to the community.

I listen. I have no agenda beyond ensuring that the city deliver its services to the residents in the most efficient and effective way possible. I recognize that I may not always know the best way to do this, but I am a firm believer in the adage that "none of us is as smart as all of us." Accordingly, I will approach each problem the city faces with open ears and a mind open to solutions that others may offer.

3. What are the three highest priorities and/or issues you believe the City needs to address? How would you propose to address these issues?

**First, the city needs to get its financial house in order**. In the last election, the voters sent a clear message that they are not yet ready to approve an operations levy, so we need to take a hard look at the city operations and look for creative solutions to reduce costs. The city is required by law to balance its budget, and revenues are not going to materially increase, so the city needs to cut costs.

In the short term, the obvious way to do this is to cut staff, which is not desirable, as doing so will almost certainly lead to service degradation, but at least some of this will be necessary. But I believe the city also needs to undertake systematic reviews of city operations to identify possible inefficiencies to be addressed. Further, the city should consider what services are part of its core mission and must be prioritized. We should also investigate more shared service offerings with other cities or the county, and consider outsourcing alternatives where necessary. All of these options come with downsides, including possible degradations of service quality, as well as potential loss of local control. But all options should be on the table.

**Second, the city has to plan for the impacts of light rail.** We need to work cooperatively with Sound Transit to minimize the impacts of bus intercept traffic and to identify options for feeder bus routes on the island to feed the light rail. We need to identify opportunities for more transit parking and last mile solutions, and encourage nearby retail development to service commuters.

Third, we need to find ways to encourage appropriately-scaled retail development in town center and support extant businesses, in part because a vibrant retail core will make Mercer Island a more desirable place to live, but also because an expanded retail tax base will help address city financial challenges. I believe a thoughtfully designed and privately funded Mercer Island Center for the Arts ("MICA") could be an important part of town center development that will help encourage visitors to town center, from both on and off island, which will provide more customers for restaurants, shops, and other Mercer Island businesses.

4. Explain your current and past community involvement and/or service on city, nonprofit, or public boards, committees, task forces, or commissions and how this has contributed to the Mercer Island community. Address its relevance to the position of Mercer Island City Councilmember.

I have served on the Mercer Island Planning Commission since July. While I am not long-tenured, my service has greatly increased my understanding of the land use issues facing the island, and better prepared me to continue this work from the Council. As an island, we have no room to grow. We need to make sure we get land use planning right.

I served on the Community Advisory Group put together by the city in 2017 to examine the city's financial challenges, where I was known for my persistence, integrity, communication skills, and

commitment to rigorous and accurate financial analysis. I co-authored the majority opinion and worked diligently as part of the campaign to pass Proposition One.

I served seven years on the Board of the Society of Actuaries ("SOA"), culminating in a one-year term as President. The SOA is a non-profit professional organization of about 30,000 members, with an annual budget of approximately \$50 million, which makes it comparable in size to Mercer Island. Here I further developed skills in financial management, strategic planning, teamwork, coalition building, communication, and leadership that will make me a more effective Council member.

# 5. What do you wish to accomplish during this appointed term as a Mercer Island City Councilmember?

An eleven-month term is short, so it will be important to set realistic goals. And it is important to remember that my only individual goals can be for learning and relationship building. Beyond that, accomplishments will not be mine, but those of the Council, the city government, and the city residents. However, I would feel very satisfied if, one year from now, I felt that the city had:

- (1) A long-term plan for financial sustainability that addressed important infrastructure needs.
- (2) Planning underway for a mixed-use development to combine MICA, retail space, and parking near the light rail station.
- (3) Identified "last mile" solutions for addressing commuter access to the light rail station.
- (4) A commitment to sustainable policies for city operations and to supporting sustainability efforts for city residents.

# 6. What is your vision for our City and community?

Mercer Island will always be a bedroom community. Residents do not want to be Seattle. We do not even want to be Bellevue. But appropriately scaled retail and cultural development in town center can make Mercer Island a better place to live for all of us. I would like to see us further develop a walkable town center that both residents and non-residents want to visit—a town center with interesting shops, quality restaurants, and art and cultural activities that we all want to experience. But we cannot allow this to endanger the residential character of the rest of the island or create undue traffic stress. Further, we must insist on maintaining or expanding open spaces and parklands. Ease of access to off-island employment and activities must be maintained or enhanced. And Mercer Island must maintain full-service city operations in order to protect our property values, our people, and our natural environment.

# 7. Is there anything else that you may wish to add that would help us get to know you better?

I am a passionate advocate for causes I believe in. I am dedicated to fact-based decision making. I believe in community engagement in decision making, but I believe that the Council should sometimes lead rather than follow. If appointed, I would hope and plan to stand for election in 2019.
