



Forest Stewardship on Mercer Island

Creating Healthy Forests & Strong Communities

A THREATENED URBAN FOREST

The City of Mercer Island is home to over 300 acres of beautiful, forested parks and open spaces that provide invaluable benefits to our community such as stormwater abatement, clean air, outdoor recreation, human health benefits, and wildlife habitat. Invasive plants such as English ivy and Himalayan blackberry threaten our existing forest canopy, inhibit the next generation of trees from establishing, and decrease habitat quality.

THE SOLUTION

Community Forest Stewardship plays a pivotal role in helping the City address these challenges. The City of Mercer Island works with professional contractors, non-profit partners Mountains to Sound Greenway and EarthCorps, and community volunteers to remove invasive plants and replant with native trees and shrubs. Together we ensure the long-term sustainability and resilience of our invaluable open spaces for current and future generations.

VOLUNTEER TODAY!

Weekend Community Events

Due to COVID-19, the City is not currently hosting large-scale volunteer events. We are working with partners to schedule small-scale events in 2022. At these events, nature lovers of all ages will be invited to have fun in the forest! Volunteers remove invasive plants, spread mulch, and plant native trees and shrubs. Service Learning and Team Building

We work with private groups such as Boy and Girl Scout troops, school clubs, companies, and religious communities to create events for as many as 100 volunteers. Projects include all tools, logistical help, and on-site guidance needed to foster a great sense of teamwork, community, and care for our forest resources.

Mercer Island Forest Stewards

Do you love the outdoors and want to learn about forest restoration? Is there an open space that has captured your heart? Consider becoming a Forest Steward at your local park or open space. Our Natural Resources staff provide volunteers with training, tools, and ongoing support. Training includes information about native plant identification, invasive plant identification and removal, native plant installation, and volunteer event coordination. Forest Stewards may work independently, making their own schedule, or lead volunteer events for friends and neighbors.



FOREST STEWARD PROGRAM – VOLUNTEER DESCRIPTION

REPORTS TO: Natural Resources Project Manager

LOCATION: Mercer Island park or open space as agreed upon by volunteer and Natural Resources staff

POSITION DESCRIPTION:

Mercer Island Forest Stewards participate in ecological restoration efforts in Mercer Island parks and open spaces. Forest Stewards adopt a park or a specific section of a park or open space where he/she works individually (making his/her own schedule) or serves as a leader to host volunteer events with friends and neighbors. Alternatively, a group of volunteers can form a “Friends of” or “Adopt a Park” group and nominate a “Forest Steward” lead to be the liaison with the City of Mercer Island.

SPECIFIC DUTIES:

- Attend an orientation site visit with the Natural Resources Specialist.
- Attend training/mentorship session with Natural Resources Specialist to learn plant identification and restoration practices.
- Work with the Natural Resources staff to identify goals and develop an annual restoration work plan.
- Request tools and supplies from the Natural Resources staff.
- Manually remove invasive species using best management practices.
- Dispose of debris on-site as outlined during orientation.
- Submit monthly volunteer hour logs to Natural Resources staff.

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Ability to perform physically demanding work such as planting, mulching, and manual removal of Himalayan blackberry and other invasive species.
- Ability to maintain positive working relationship with staff, other volunteers, and park visitors.
- Good organization and communication skills.
- Willingness to learn about ecological restoration practices.

DESIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Knowledge of PNW native and invasive plants.
- Knowledge of forest restoration and invasive plant removal methods.
- If hosting volunteer events, experience working with youth, young adults, and adult volunteers in an outdoor setting.
